One-day seminars, so-called regional seminars, (in Košice, Banská Bystrica, Pezinok) for judges and prosecutors are aimed at selected legal issues. Lastly, one- day seminars (in Košice, Banská Bystrica, Pezinok) are targeted at higher court officials within their competences set by specific legal act. This category of training also includes frequently organised language courses, which are being used as a promising tool for improving legal terminology in German, English and French. These courses are organised as a three-day seminars twice a year.
