	The duties of a judicial assistant include the following:	
	assist in the judicial process and carry out any research or other work required by the court, administer oaths, take the testimony of any person produced as witness in court proceedings, taking an affidavit in matters connected with court proceedings and to hold sittings as may be directed by the court and meet advocates of the parties in order to plan the management of the lawsuit, assistance to the judiciary in drafting decisions.
